Key Trends in Metro Voter Views

Key Findings of Surveys of People in the Portland Region Conducted 2018 - 2025



Tracking Change in Attitudes Over Time

- This presentation will include comparisons to prior survey research conducted with voters, and people ages 18+, throughout the region.
- Our survey methodology has evolved over time as Metro's needs have dictated, including approaches ranging from telephone-only surveys of registered voters to mixed-mode surveys of regional adults.
- Survey methodologies will continue to evolve as the way people use technology and communication platforms shifts.
- Given these methodological variations, there are limitations in our ability to make precise apples-to-apples comparisons between surveys.
- Nevertheless, the broad consistency between surveys conducted with various methodologies – and the degree to which they echo sentiments expressed in the qualitative research – underscore the validity of the trends described here.











Key Findings

- The mood in the Portland region has been improving compared with a low point in 2022, though it is still more negative than positive.
- Views of County governments differ significantly, with Multnomah County voters consistently holding the most-negative views of their leadership.
- Homelessness, housing costs, and the cost of living are driving concerns with broad and growing shares expressing the seriousness of these issues over many years.
- While most say they support tax increases for things that they see as very important in principle, increasing shares are concerned about the amount they pay in local taxes.
- Large shares of voters are concerned with the inability of local government to solve major problems. Voters also say that the most important consideration for them when deciding whether to support a tax measure is whether they trust an agency to spend the tax dollars wisely.
- Few see their local government as needing more revenue in principle, though voters support specific investments in concept.


November 2028 Electorate Sample by County and Ideology

Self-Described Ideology by County






Regional Context















Numbers

Metro serves nearly 1.7 million people in Clackamas, Multnomah, and Washington counties, and is led by an elected council. Metro is funding construction of nearly 5,600 affordable homes regionwide, and supportive services that help people find and stay in housing. Metro also manages the region's garbage and recycling system, protects clean water and habitat at more than 19,000 acres of parks and natural areas, and oversees long-range planning across 24 cities and 3 counties. In addition, Metro also manages the Oregon Convention Center, Portland'5 Centers for the Arts, Portland Expo Center and the Oregon Zoo.

Regional Scope


Local governments are responsible for dealing with the problems within their boundaries. Metro looks at the needs of the entire Portland region, especially issues that cannot be solved by one city or county alone – like making housing more affordable, creating good-paying jobs, and protecting rivers and natural areas. Metro also plans and provides the services it just makes sense to provide across city and county lines, like regional arts and recreation venues, transportation, and garbage and recycling. Metro plays a vital role when it comes to protecting the region's quality of life.

Future Focus

Local governments are responsible for dealing with the day-to-day problems within their boundaries. Metro looks out for the long-term future of the entire Portland region -- beyond the immediate local problems of today. This future focus supports good decisions now to make sure this region is livable for future generations, with good-paying jobs, housing that's affordable, a well-functioning transportation system, and protecting the parks, nature, arts and culture that make our region special.



The "numbers" version performs best, lifting Metro's favorability rating to just under half of voters.





In a survey immediately post-2024 election, Metro area voters told us that the economy and inflation were top of mind.


When making up your mind about which candidates to vote for in this year's elections, what were the most important factors that guided your decisions?

(Open-ended; Multiple Responses Accepted)






Despite reporting a range of actual household incomes, Metro area voters mostly see themselves as "middle income."


But that era has ended.



December 2019 and May 2025 Forecasts










Oregonians Divided on Population Growth: Nearly Half See Both Pros and Cons








Oregon Home Prices Far Outpace Incomes Since 1990

Indexed, 1990 = 100

























Approval Rating for Specific Regional Government Services







Voters largely believe that their local governments raise enough revenue to meet local needs adequately already.








Nearly four in five say they vote for local tax increases for things they see as very important ...

Which of the following three statements comes closest to your opinion? Please choose just one even if it's hard to decide.






Which of the following approaches would you prefer that regional government take to address the fact that the cost of providing services is increasing, while the property tax revenue that funds these services is largely unchanged:








Ballot Measure Decision-Making

Metro voters typically approve finance measures by broad margins - though the transportation measure failed in the face of strong opposition, and the Zoo bond passed more narrowly.






Measure decision-making is typically based on three questions.

We typically find that voters evaluate measures by asking three questions about them:

- 1. Does the measure fund a service that they identify as an appropriate need?
- 2. Does the proposed funding mechanism strike them as fair and affordable?
- 3. Do they **trust the agency** that will collect and distribute the funds? If the answer to all three questions is **yes**, they will typically vote in favor of a measure.

In a Sept. poll, voters said their top considerations when voting on a measure are trust in government and where the funding will be spent.

When it comes to considering your vote on a proposed local tax measure, which is the most important consideration?





What can be done to address these considerations in crafting a ballot measure?



- 1. Appropriate need: Clearly align the outcomes of the measure with voters' priorities
- 2. Fair and affordable: Thoroughly vet these factors through polling, then build a coalition that supports it, and avoid organized opposition
- 3. Trust the agency: Do a good job spending the money you have and show progress




